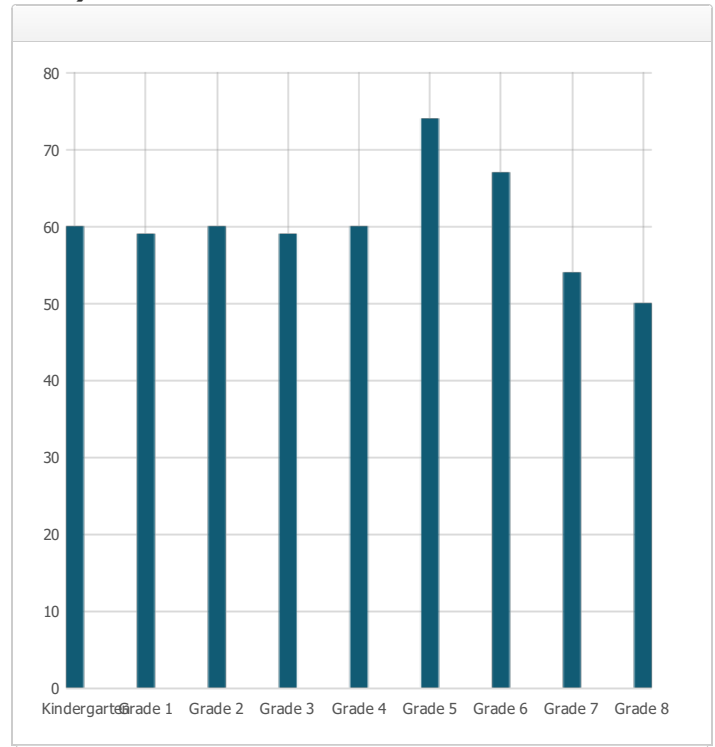
School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2019—20)

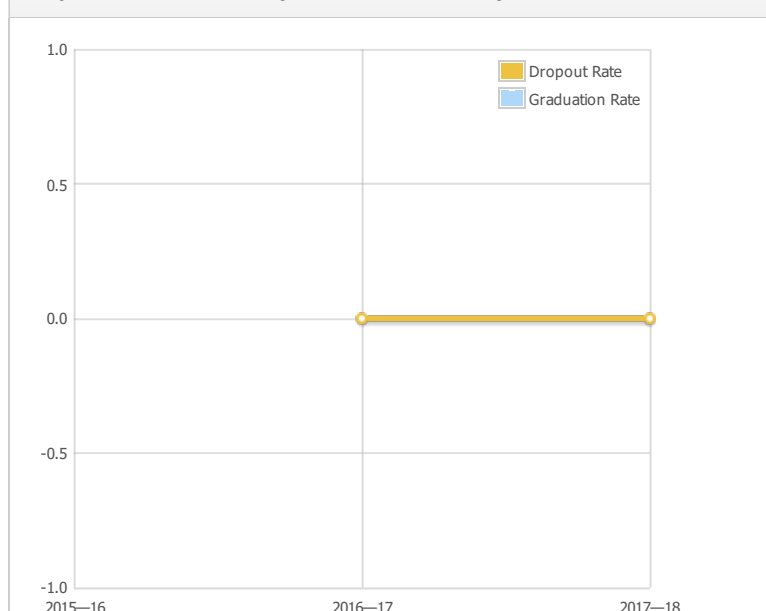
