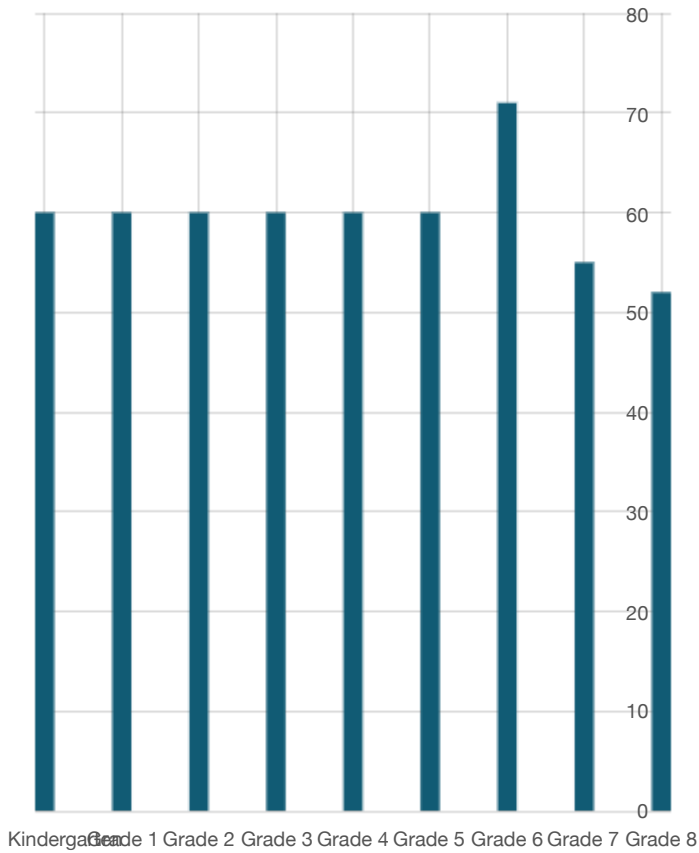
School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2020–2021)

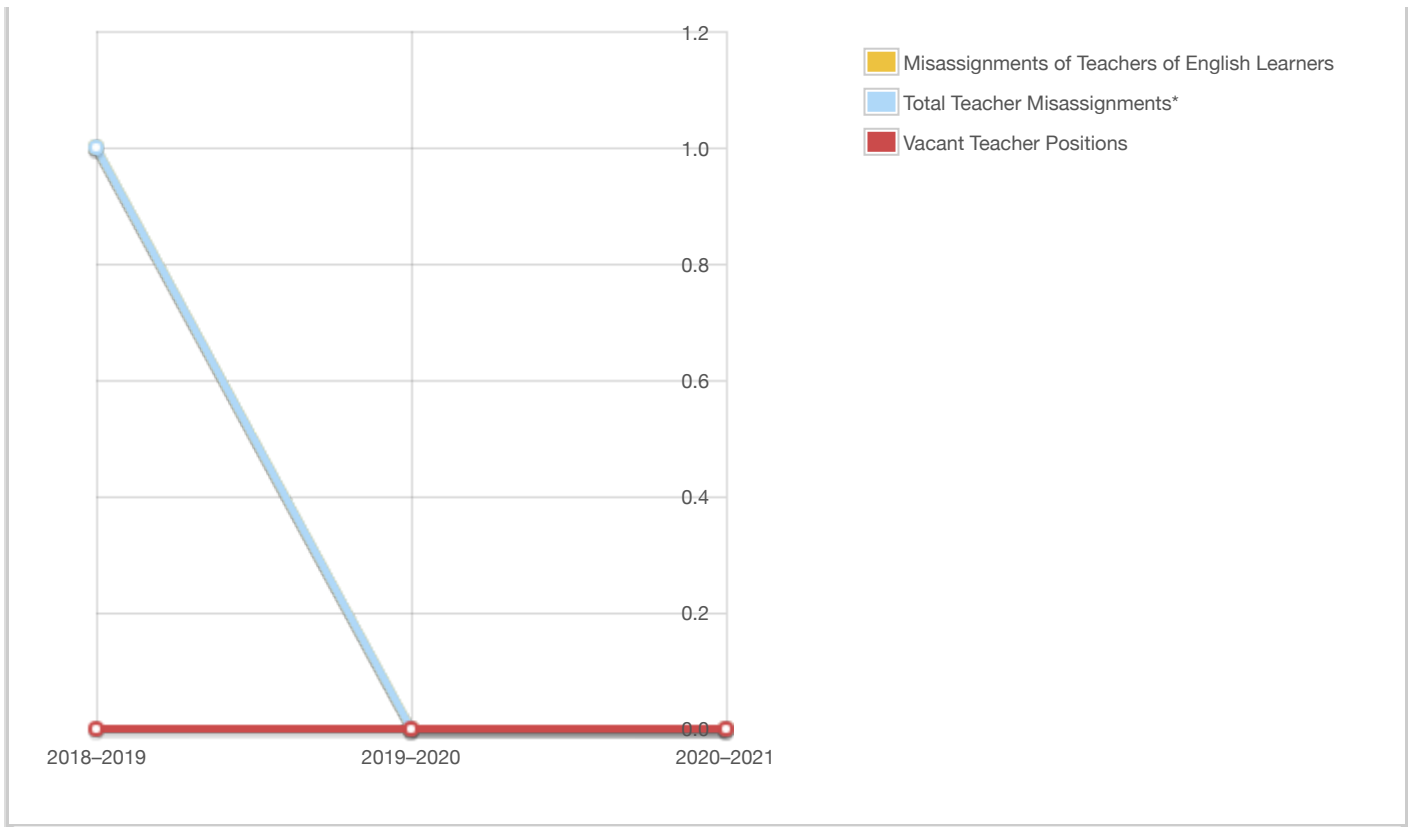

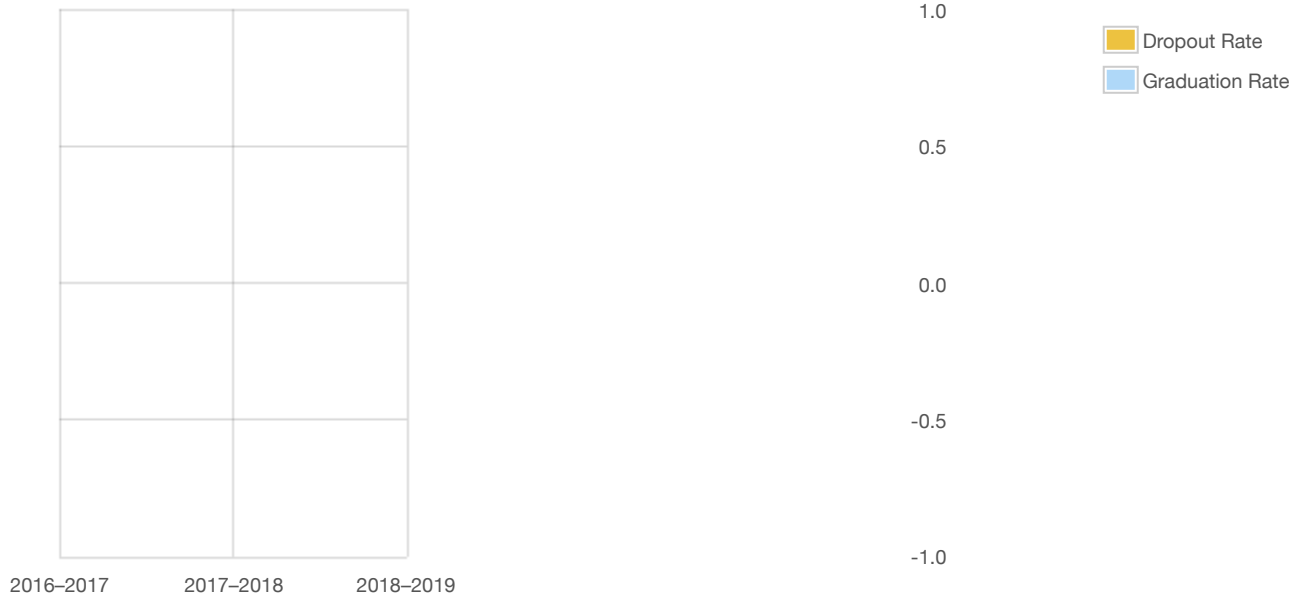

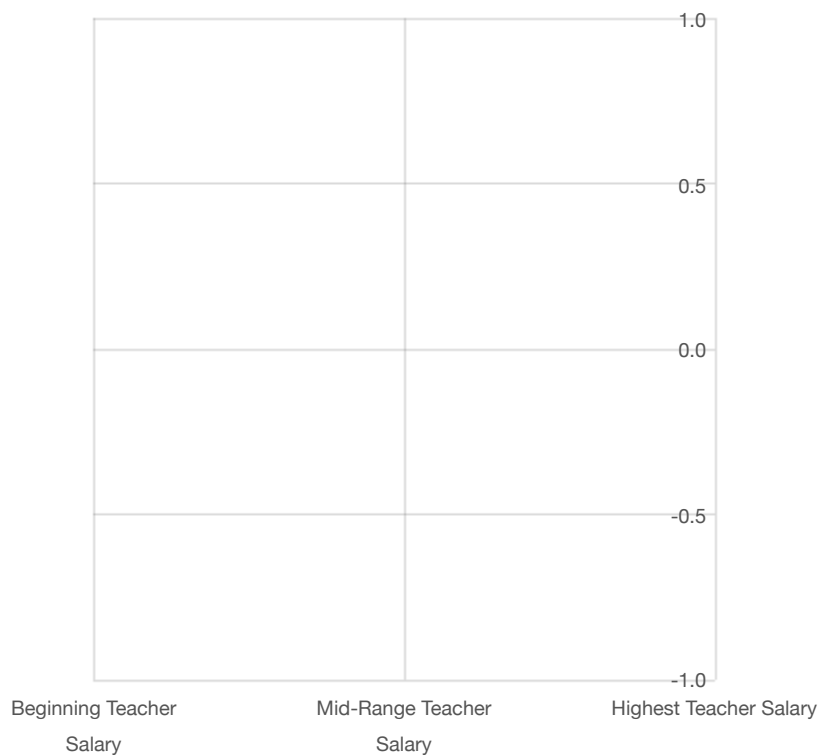

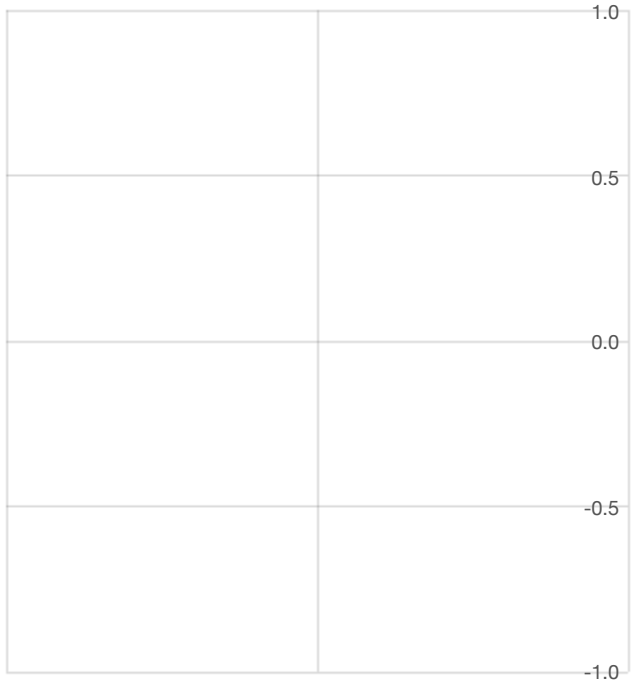
